JAN. 16, 1864.—The annual meeting of the Susquehanna County Agricultural Society was held at the Court-house in Montrose, in pursuance of the Constitution and public notice. The business first in order being the election of officers for the ensuing year, on motion, voted, that the President appoint a Committee of five to report names of suitable men to fill the offices of the Society for the ensuing year. Whereupon, Messrs. J. S. Tarbell, J. H. McCain, Henry Drinker, A. N. Ballard, and E. B. Beardsley, were appointed said Committee, who retired for the purpose of consultation.
