Another case of Loyalty.

"We have recently heard of another case of extreme 'loyalty' on the part of some furious war patriots in the county of Susquehanna, just above us. In the township of Lenox, resides a wealthy family of four brothers, one of whom is no less a personage than the Hon. Galusha A. Grow. They have all been very anxious that everybody around them should go to the war, until since the recent bounty law was passed, an attempt was made to put it in force in that township. This effort was defeated by these brothers, who would have had the great bulk of the tax to pay—and thus is poor Lenox left in the draft. These "last man and last dollar" people do not like the dance when they are called on to pay the piper."—Lucerne Union.

—We have heard similar statements from Lenox. Several thousand dollars had been raised to pay bounties, when the volunteering business was put a stop to by the Glenwood "loyalists." It is proper to say that while Grow's tax would be heavy, it would not, perhaps, be "the great bulk of the tax." But they didn't want to pay it.

Borough Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Montrose, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That the boundary lines of the said Borough of Montrose be extended as follows:

Beginning at a point sixteen rods north-easterly from the present north corner of the Borough, in range with the northwest line thereof, thence due east about 250 perches so as to include the house of R. F. Jameson, thence due south about one mile to a point east of the "Dunn house," thence west about 212 perches to a point at or near the south corner of the Borough, thence west far enough to make one mile, taking in the houses of R. Gillihan, John B. Hazleton, and F. B. Coon, thence north one mile and thence east to the place of beginning, making the north line also one mile, and the whole one mile square.
