Important Local News Citizens of Montrose who allow their fowls, dogs, etc., to visit their neighbors' gardens should remember that they—the dogs and fowls—are liable to come to grief and an early grave, "according to law." Also that COWS are prohibited from running at Aurge in any street or road at any time by a State law, in addition to the Borough Ordinance.

Borough Ordinance.

That it shall not be lawful for any neat cattle, horses; swine, sheep, geese, or other domesticated animals of a mischievous nature; to go at large in said boro' (of Montrose); and if any such animal shall be found at large within said boro, it shall be the duty of the High Constable forthwith to take up and impound the same; or if any of the said animals shall be found in any lot or close, it shall be the duty of the High Constable at the request of the owner or occupant of said close, to take up and impound the same.

That if any dog, turkey, duck, hen or fowl, shall be found in any cellar, barn, outhouse, GARDEN, or close, in said boro', it shall be LAWFUL for the owner or occupant thereof to KILL, take and carry away such dog, turkey, duck, hen or other fowl.
