That it shall not be lawful for any neat cattle, horses, swine, sheep, geese, or other domesticated animals of a mischievous nature, to go at large in said boro' (of Montrose); and if any such animal shall be found at large within said boro', it shall be the duty of the High Constable it shall be the duty of the High Constable forthwith to take up and impound the same; or if any of the said animals shall be found in any lot or close, it shall be the duty of the High Constable at the request be found in any lot or close, it shall be the duty of the High Constable at the request of the owner or occupant of said close, to take up and impound the same.

That if any dog, turkey, duck, hen or fowl, shall be found in any cellar, barn, outhouse, GARDEN, or close, in said boro', it shall be LAWFUL for the owner or occupant thereof to KILL, take and carry away such dog, turkey, duck, hen or other fowl.


