Miss Dickinson, the pet oracle of the Administration, in a recent speech in New York, said: "The war must not cease till the black man sits on the Bench of the Supreme Court of the United States with the white judges."

Uncle Abe signalized his re-nomination by a recommendation to Congress to repeal the \$300 exemption clause. This is the first gun of the political campaign.

While every interest is being heavily taxed to carry on New England's war, New England's special interest—her fisheries—is fostered by a large bounty paid out of the common treasury, and on a vote to abolish the unjust provision, all the abolition Senators but these from Western states voted to retain it.
