He was in this city on business, and on the afternoon of the 19th of May, as he was walk ing along the street, an officer tapped him upon the shoulder and invited him to go to the provost. From here he was taken to the provost. From here he was taken to the parracks, without permission being they have on hand an extensive stock of to the barracks, without permission being granted to go to his hotel or my place for the purpose of being identified, or satisfying all parties interested in his loyalty to the government. No charges were made against him, and he was not informable against him, and he was not informable cause of his arrest, although he demanded to know the cause.

A portion of the time that he remained at the barracks he was closely confined in a most filthy hole with the worst crimin-als. His money and all his effects were taken away from him; he was not allowed to have food furnished him from the outwhere he was closely confined in a cell and compelled to live on prison diet. Yes-terday afternoon about half-past five o'clock, Mr. Brockway, Superintendent of the House of Correction, called him from his cell into the office of the prison, and told him that he was free to go. There was no papers, no officers, no explanation of the cause of his arrest and detention.

He was simply told to go, and up to this moment he has never been told why he was arrested, nor were there any charges made against him, nor any trial. He does not know why he was arrested, why he was detained in close confinement for a month or more, nor why he was finally discharged. The above statement of facts is brief, but there is food for much seriousness and candor. Is not the iron heel of a worse than Austrian despotism upon the necks of American citizens?
