The fact was laid before Collector Barney, who, it is alleged, had the matter worked up, which resulted in the finding of a number of choice hams at two of the officials' houses in this city. One of the gentlemen over whom he has power was invited to call upon him, when he was politely informed that if he did not resign he would be incontinently removed from his position. Fearing the matter would leak out, he accepted the former proposition. The other official is entirely under the jurisdiction of the authorities in Washington.


