Volunteer Bounty Law.

At the recent extra session of the Legislature a supplement to the bounty law was passed, which is in substance as follows:

In all cases where county commissioners are authorized to pay bounties to volunteers, but neglected to do so, the authorities or election board of each township or borough shall have full power to do so; and where county commissioners shall pay a bounty of less than \$300, the town authorities may raise a sum sufficient to pay each non-commissioned officer and private \$300 who may enter the service under this or any future call for troops.

Where a majority of the citizens of any town have raised bounties with the understanding that they should be repaid by taxes, the authorities are required to levy a tax to cover the same, provided the bounty to each volunteer shall not exceed \$300.

Any person liable to draft who puts in a substitute for a year or longer, credited to the town, and shall have paid the said substitute the full pay it was agreed he should receive, such person shall receive from the town the amount of bounty; provided that if the bounty offered by the town is greater than he paid to the substitute, the difference shall be paid over to the substitute.

No county or town tax for bounties shall be over two per cent. in any one year.

It shall be lawful for the county or town authorities to collect a per capita tax on all taxable male inhabitants, of not more than \$5 a year, provided that non-commissioned officers and privates in actual service, or who are disabled permanently, and the property of widows, minor children, and widowed mothers of non-commissioned officers or privates who died in service shall be exempt from taxation under this act.
