Preparation for Another Draft.

ALBANY, Nov. 21, '64.
Protost Marshal General Fry has written Governor Seymour, expressing his desire that a more careful examination should be made in towns and cities of persons liable to military duty, with the view of reaching the correct quota for a future draft. Governor Seymour has issued a proclamation accordingly.

State Militia to be Enrolled.

HEAD QUARTERS P. A. MILITIA, Harrisburg, Nov. 12, 1864.—General Order No. 2.—The effort to raise by volunteering that portion of the Pennsylvania State Guard ordered into service by General Orders No. 1, having proved abortive, it is ordered:

1. That an immediate enrollment and classification of the Militia of the Commonwealth be made in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of Assembly, of May 14th, and August 23rd, 1864.
2. That the Commissioners of the several Cities and Counties of the Commonwealth are hereby required and directed to issue, forthwith, their precepts to the Assessors of their respective Cities and Counties, authorizing and commanding them to make an immediate enrollment and classification of all able bodied white male citizens, within their respective limits, liable to enrollment under the Militia Laws of the Commonwealth.
3. Brigadier General Lemuel Todd, State Inspector, General, is charged with the execution of this order.

Cheating the Soldiers.

U. S. Hospital, Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 9th, 1864.

MR. EDITOR:—Thinking that perhaps some of your readers would be interested with the particulars of a most outrageous fraud perpetrated upon the Democratic portion of the soldiers in this Hospital, in regard to the election, I will give them to you.

On Monday, the day preceding the election, a man named Bolser from Fayette county, a member of the 11th Pennsylvania Regiment, and an inmate of this Hospital visited every ward and inquired for men who intended to vote for McClellan, to each one he gave a sealed envelope stamped McClellan and Pendleton, and endorsed "For a Union Soldier."

These envelopes contained a speech delivered before the Allegheny Democratic Club, a McClellan badge and two or three Lincoln tickets each. Thinking from the loyal character of the envelopes and badges and the unmistakable loyalty of the documents that the tickets were as they should be, they were treated accordingly and many of them voted.

Late in the evening the man Bolser was discovered wearing a Lincoln badge; this led to an examination of his tickets and consequent detection of his wholesale fraud.

The whole of this statement is true and I defy contradiction from any quarter. Let those who prize above all the soldiers' rights, the purity of the ballot-box and frauds on the part of the Democratic party, read this and reflect upon it. The party which can with such shameless effrontery do the liver of Heaven to serve the devil, which has the blackness of heart to conceive and the boldness to perpetrate such an atrocity will stop at nothing however base and criminal.
