1st. To all Soldiers the bounties promised to them no
matter for what reason or reasons they may have been
discharged, provided such discharges were not for disabilities existing prior to enlistment, or were not ordered as punishment.

2d. To three months' men one-eighth of \$100—\$12 00.

3d. To air months' men one quarter of \$100—\$25.

4th. To inine months' men three-eighths of \$100—

3d. To six months' men one quarter of \$100-\$25.

4th. To 'nine' months' men three-eighths of \$100-\$37.

50.

5th. To one years' men \$100 bounty, as promised.

6th. To all men discharged within two years by reason of disabilities contracted while in the service (not alone on account of wounds received in action.) the full bounty to be given them by the act of Congress under which they were enlisted.

7th. To all men discharged by reason of promotion, a pro rats bounty according to the act under which they enlisted for the time they served as enlisted men.

8th. Of \$100 bounty to all Soldiers of the regular army who enlisted in 1839. '60, or '61, (prior to the act of July 1861.) and who served their full term of five years, or who were discharged, after two years from the beginning of the war, or who were discharged by reason of disabilities contracted in the war since June 16th. 1860.

9th. Of \$100 bounty to all deserters who regoined tacher regiments and served two years exclusive of the time they were absent without leave.
