

COUNTY AFFAIRS.

Democratic County Convention. The Democratic voters of Susquehanna County are respectfully requested to meet at the usual place of holding their primary meetings in the several townships and boroughs, on

SATURDAY, SEPT. FIRST, and elect two delegates to attend a County Convention to be held at the Court House, in Montrose, on

MONDAY, SEPT. THIRD, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to nominate a County ticket, and to transact such other business as may properly be presented.

Each district will also elect one person to act as member of the County Committee for the year 1867.

The officers of the Democratic Clubs in the several towns are directed to give public notice of the hour and place of holding the delegate elections, attend and take special charge of the same, and give the delegates elect the proper credentials.

If any town is yet without organization, let a meeting be called and arrangements be made on or before Sept. 1st, so that every district may be represented in Convention.
