Public Schools.

. The County Superintendent of this County reports, for the month of January, visits to 58 schools, three of which have been re-visited, making in all 61 visit. The visitations made with him are as follows: Two by Teachers, eighteen by citizens, and fifty-five by Directors. He has held three special public examinations by request of Directors, at which 18 teachers were examined, of whom five were rejected. Also, that he has traveled 284 miles, written 30 official letters, and spent 27 days in official duty.

A special public examination will be held at Friendsville, Feb. 9th, at which none will be examined except a written request be presented, signed by at least four Directors of the District in which

they are employed. During the month of February, Schools in the following townships will be visited Middletown, Rush, Anburn, Springville Dimock, Lathrop, Lenox, and Clifford. Mr. J. M: Craford has been employed
