Subscription Lists Contracts, Promissory Notes.

When a subscription is for a purpose in which there is a community of interest among the subscribers, the list should be stamped as a contract, or agreement, at the Tite of five cents for each sheet or piece of paper upon which it is written.

When there is no community of interec, and the subscription is conditional, each signer executes a separate contract, requiring its appropriate amount of stamp-; this amount depends upon the number of sheets or pieces of paper upon which the contract is written.

When each of the subscribers contracts to pay a certain and definite sum of monon demand, or at a time designated. the separate contract of each should be stamped at the same rate as a promissory note.
