Gen. Geary's Standing Army.
Gen. Geary and the Radicals have made a beginning to establish a standing army in Pennsylvania. A bill recently passed the Legislature which provides for the establishment of a military police despotism in the counties in the mining region.
It provides that, on the application of one hundred citizens of any county in the mining region, the Governor shall appoint not more than one hundred policemen, who shall be armed and equipped as soldiers, and have the same power as a constable or deputy-sheriff, with the addition that they may arrest offenders in adjoining counties. The Governor may also appoint a marshal of police, having the power of a sheriff, at a salary of \$2,000 a year. The Governor may also create distinction of rank, fix the rate of compensation, and make all rules and regulations for the government of the police. All expenses to be borne by the county, and the act to remain in force for two years.
