To School Directors,

There appears to be a general neglicence on the part of School Directors, to publish the account of the receipts and expenditures of their respective districts as required by the Act of Assembly. The State Superintendent of Common Schools states that this section of the law is as obligatory upon the Board of Directors as is the section requiring them to keep open schools, and a neglect to perform this duty according to the law subjects Directors to removal by the courts, the same as the reglect of any other duty required by law.

Publication of the Laws.

It is almost impossible to find out what Acts of the Legislature have become laws. By the present absurd mode of publishing the laws, the public do not get to know what laws have been passed, for six or eight mouths after the adjournment of the Legislature, when the Pamphlet Laws make their appearence. And even then, in this shape, they only reach county officers and Justices of the Peace whilst the people who are bound to obey laws, never get to see them in print. All the general laws should be published in the newspapers of the different counties, and all local acts should be published in the same way, in the localities to which they apply. We hope the pert Legislature will pass an not requiring the publication of the laws in the newspapers, so that the people may learn what laws have been passed.
