Catching Haws.

Charles B. Holbrook, of Forest Lake township, in this county, informs us that be has captured twenty-three Haws of the variety known as "hen hawks," since the first of April, 1867. His mode is to erect a fence rail in the central portion of the field, with a mink-trap imbedded in the top end, so as to be not readily noneed. TWO COMMISSIONERS TO BE ELECTED. The act provides for the election, triennially, of two jury commissioners, the first to be chosen at the coming October election, for three years: They are not to be eligible for re election more than in once in any period of six years.
