The New Baggage Law.

The law regulating the amount of baggige each passenger on the Pennsvivania railroads shall be allowed to carry, which was passed at the last session of the Legislature, is now in force. It provides that each passenger-shall be entitled to carry one trunk or box not exceeding one hundred pounds in weight; that when bagrage shall be lost and damages claimed, a sum not to exceed three hundred dollars shall be allowed for each trunk or box together with its contents; that if any person wishes to carry more weight or greater value of baggage than this, he or she must have the trunk or box weighed by the baggage agent before starting, disclos- ending


