Every peddler should be prepared to produce a special tax receipt in his own name, upon the demand of an internal revenue officer. It is not sufficient for him to produce a receipt issued to another person, even though that other may have been employed by the same party and upon the same wagon.

Shooting Affair.

A young man, son of Lewis Armstrong, late commissioner of this county, who resides near Factoryville Depot, was shot by a man named DeMerse, a few days since. The circumstances as related to us are as follows: DeMerse, who is said to be an irritable and violent tempered man, had been annoyed by the conduct of some boys in the neighborhood, and threatened to shoot them and in pursuance of his threat he had procured a minnie rifle. The young man, Armstrong, who it is said had no intimation of danger, when passing the garden of DeMerse, in the fore part of the evening, went into it for the purpose of getting a radish. While thus engaged DeMerse who was near by shot him. The ball which was of the largest size, entered near the point of the shoulder blade and passed out at the breast. At last accounts the young man was alive though his wound is said to be such as will probably prove fatal.

It is a boon, as great in its way, as the discovery of a new metal or of a new motive of power. The Appletons deserve the credit of introducing the American public to an entirely new realm of fiction, wherein the enchantment wand is wielded by a new hand. We allude to the brilliant series of novels by Miss Mulbach, now in course of publication at their house. The writer is a German woman, living, we believe, in Berlin; and her novels are first published there, and translated here by practised hands. Of herself we know nothing; but her intellectual powers are vividly revealed in the works under notice. She is a person of erudition extensive, and quite accurate, possessing an extraordinary imagination, a gift of making dialogue, which fits her well for a high order of dramas, if she cared to attempt them, a vein of wit which is French, and of humor which is English, besides a realistic style of description which belongs of right to the age of the photograph.

Convention of Teachers.

An adjourned meeting of teachers held at New Milford June 21st and 22d, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted: Whereas, a supplement to an act for the regulation and continuance of a system of education by Common Schools, approved the 9th day of April, 1867, requires the county superintendent of each county to hold a Teachers' Institute as often as once a year, at such time and place as he or a properly authorized committee of teachers acting with him, may deem most convenient. Therefore, resolved, 1. That a Convention of teachers be called to be held in Montrose August 16 and 17. 2. That said meeting be composed of two teachers appointed as delegates to represent each township or school district, except the borough of Dundaff and Little Meadows, and Chapman and Oakland independent districts, which shall be entitled to one delegate each. 3. That each delegate be entitled to one vote in determining the time and place for holding the county Teachers' Institute next fall. 4. That all the teachers in this county

and other persons interested in popular education be invited to attend.

5. That each teacher present shall be entitled to a vote on all questions brought before the Convention, except the two named in resolution third, which shall be left to the delegates only.

6. That the Teachers' Institute be organized at this meeting, so far as consistent with the second section of the supplement to the school law.

The following teachers are appointed as delegates, to meet in Montrose, Aug. 16th and 17th, 1867, for the purpose of organizing the County Institute to be held next fall, and transacting such other business as may come before the Convention:

The Convention will convene at 2 o'clock, Friday, Aug. 16th, and continue in session till 2 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 17th.
