Whereas, a supplement to an act for the regulation and continuance of a system of education by Common Schools, approved the 9th day of April, 1867, requires the county superintendent of each county to hold a Teachers' Institute as often as once a year, at such time and place as he or a properly authorized committee of toachers acting with him, may deem most convenient. 3. That each delegate be entitled to one vote in determining the time and place for holding the county Teachers' Institute

4. That all the teachers in this county

education be invited to attend. 5. That each teacher present shall be entitled to a vote on all questions brought employed, will be held at Auburn Centre before the Convention, except the two named in resolution third; which two shall be left to the delegates only.
6. That the Teachers' Institute be or-
