Ferocious Bread Riots.

LONDON, November 9.—Disturbances have again broken out in Devonshire. There was bread riots at Barnstable to-day which exceeded in ferocity and destructiveness the riots at Exeter. The mob broke into butcher shops and bakeries, plundered them and set them on fire. The police and military were obliged to fire upon the mob.

Horses Stolen.

Mr. Asel Bradley, of Union, N. Y., had a splendid team of horses, with a wagon, harness and two buffalo robes stolen from his barn on the night of the 5th inst. A team answering the description passed through here two days after, and they were followed up into Ninewa, Broome County; but it is thought now that they were another team. Several fine teams have been stolen from the vicinity of Union, and none of them have ever been recovered. The horses were dark bay, well matched, one a mare and the other a gelding, the harness was silver plated, and the buggy a low one, the box sitting well down between the axles. A large reward is offered for the recovery of the property, and one also for the conviction of the thieves. The rig was valued at \$800.—Pennsylvanian.
