Washington, born Feb. 22, 1782; Adams, Oct. 19, 1735; Jefferson, Apr. 2, 1743; Madison, March 5, 1751; Monroe, Apr. 2, 1759. Of the 17 Presidents 11 born in the slave states

Jackson was 70 years of age, when his term of office expired; Harrison and Buchanan 69; Taylor 65; John Q. Adams 62; Van Baren 58; Tyler 35; Polk 54; Filmore and Pierce 53; Lincoln 56. Johnson at Lincoln's death was 45 days the oldest. The former born Dec. 29, 1808; the latter Feb. 12, 1809. The three living Ex Presidents-Fillmore, Pierce and Buchanan, support Johnson, in his opposition to the reconstruction acts, so called of Congress.
