Testing Kerosene Oil.

Explosions from the use of kerosene are so frequent and disastrous that a simple method of determining the quality of the oil may save many lives. This may be done by means of a thermometer, a little warm water, and a spoonful of the oil. Fill the cup with warm water, the temperature of which is to be brought to 110 Fahrenheit; pour the oil on the wate; apply flame to the floating oil by means of a match or otherwise. If the oil is unsafe, it will take fire, and its use in a lamp is dangerous, for it is liable to explode. If the oil is pure and safe, it will not take fire. Some test similar to this is generally used by judicious dealers.-
