Testing Kerosene Oil.

Explosions from the use of kerosene are so frequent and disastrous that a simple method of determining the quality of the oil may save many lives. This may be done by means of a thermometer, a little warm water, and a spoonful of the oil. Fill the cup with warm water, the temperature of which is to be brought to 110 Fahrenheit; pour the oil on the water; apply flame to the floating oil by means of a match or otherwise. If the oil is unsafe, it will take fire, and its use in a lamp is dangerous, for it is liable to explode. If the oil is pure and safe, it will not take fire. Some test similar to this is generally used by judicious dealers.—[Ex.]

Court Proceedings—First Week.

Geo. Holmes appointed Constable of Gibson. Thos. Fernan fined \$10 and costs for keeping tipping house. Fanny Warren was indicted for fornication and gave bail to appear at next term. Abel Arnold was indicted for adultery and gave bail to next term. S. Langdon was appointed commissioner of the poor for Montrose and Bridge-water. Daniel Smith was indicted for assault and battery. Leroy Sweet plead guilty of assault and battery; fined \$10 and costs. Also indicted for disturbing assembly, (a singing school.) C. J. Whipple appointed deputy constable of Montrose. Court made decree of incorporation of the M. E. Church of Union in Springville. Same in case of first M. E. Church of Lenoxville. N. D. Snyder gave bail to answer at next term, on charge of selling liquor on Sunday. Lorenzo D. Bunnell indicted for larceny but acquitted. Court sentences S. F. Edsell, (charged with desertion,) to pay his wife \$5 per month.

Jacob H. Conklin was found guilty of false pretences. Z. B. Sutton was fined \$10 and costs for assault and battery. Michael Miller was indicted for larceny; found guilty on second count, and fined \$1 and costs. Winton Bailey was fined \$10 and costs for assault and battery. James P. Faurot was convicted of larceny; and reasons were filed for new trial. Charles Lindsey and Frank Herrick were fined \$10 each, and costs for disturbing a public assembly. Thomas H. B. Lyon, was admitted to practice as an attorney. E. B. Curtis vs. executors of Truman Baldwin; verdict for defendants.

Township Elections. An act abolishing the spring elections was passed by the late Legislature. The following is the bill: Be it enacted, &c., That hereafter all city, ward, borough and township officers in this commonwealth shall be elected at the time and place fixed by law for holding the annual election for state and county officers, and the judges and inspectors of elections shall receive, count and make return of all votes cast for said city, ward, borough and township officers as is required by law in the case of city, ward, borough and township elections.

The first election under this act shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, 1869, and the term of all city, ward, borough and township officers so elected shall begin and end the same as if they had been elected at the times heretofore fixed by law for city, ward, borough and township elections. No assessors shall be elected for any ward, borough or township at the annual election to be held on the second Tuesday of October, 1869, but the assessors elected at the annual election for 1869 shall act for 1871, as required by existing laws. This act shall not apply to Philadelphia.

Soldiers in the War of 1812.

The Legislature has passed an Act which has been signed by the Governor, which gives to all soldiers who served two months in said war, or the widow of such soldier if he be deceased, a bounty of \$40 and a yearly pension of \$40, provided that the applicant prove that he or she does not own personal property of the value of \$500. Any soldier who has not served two months, if he was in an actual engagement with the enemy is entitled to the bounty, as is his widow also in case of death.

This act revives the act of 13th March, 1866, which was repealed in 1867, with some additional provisions and regulations as to proof of service, death, &c.

Lehigh Valley Railroad.

The construction of this road is being pushed forward vigorously. We learn that a mile and a half of track is laid this side of Pittston so that locomotives pass over it. The road is expected to be completed to this place by the 4th of July.—"Look out for the machine when the bell rings!"—Wyoming Republican.

Assassination of D'Arcy McGee.

At half past two o'clock on the morning of 7th of April, the Hon. D'Arcy McGee was shot dead by an unknown assassin, as he was entering the house where he lodged. Since then a number of arrests have been made; the evidence against one of them, a man named Whalen, is very conclusive, and it is rumored that he has made a confession, implicating several confederates.

The Erie Railroad Accident.

New York, April 16.—The number killed on the Erie Railroad by the accident yesterday is now said to be twenty-four.

Gov. Fenton has signed the Brown under ground railroad bill, for a tunnel railroad from City Hall Park, New York city, to Westchester county, New York.

Thad Stevens says that the Constitution, the fundamental law, "is too old fashioned to suit this progressive age."

Budgett, one of Ben Butler's witnesses against the President, is under indictment for perjury.

Two negroes were arrested in Memphis on Tuesday evening for a rape on a little white girl about eight years old.

The Radicals have tampered with the "Legislative Record" so as to keep out Hickman's black speech.

A correspondent alludes to the fact that "the figures representing the anti-Radical majority in Connecticut also represent the year in which Cornwallis surrendered—both being 1781." It is rather a suggestive coincidence.

Gen. Grant, it is said, has taken to going to the New School Presbytery Church. That is about equal to Old Abe's trick of catching up a Bible and pretending to be profoundly engaged in reading it, when a committee of clergymen were coming in to see him.

Under the partisan Registry bill just passed by the Rads and signed by Geary, to secure the disfranchisement of the poor naturalized foreigners and working classes, the election expenses of the State will be at least three times as great as under the old law. And for what? Simply to enable the mongrels to keep poor white men away from the polls by putting them to unnecessary trouble, vexation and loss of time and money.
