Robbery at Lenoxville.

A very bold robbery is reported to have occurred at Lenoxville, in Susquehanna county, ten miles west of our town, on Wednesday morning of this week.

Unstamped Cigars.

Dealers should not purchase Cigars unless each box has a whole-stamp around it. If the stamp be cut or broken, it is prima facia evidence of fraud-that a box has been refilled without being inspected and stamped, and that the tax has not been paid; and both seller and purchaser are liable to penalties. We quote from the law:

"That if any person shall sell, or conrign, or remove for sale, or part with the possession of any manufactured tobacco, souff, or cigars upon which the taxes imposed by law have not been paid, with the knowledge thereof, such person shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each offence. And any person who shall purchase or receive for sale any such tobacco, snuff or cigars, which has not been inspected, branded or stamped as required by law, or upon which the tax has not been paid, with knowledge thereof, shall be liab e to a penalty of fifty dollars tor each and every offence."


