To Destroy Potnto Bags.

A wisconsin correspondent, gives the following suggestions in reference to meeting the inroads of potato bugs:

Let each man take a tin basin or an get right down on his knees and search out every bug to be found; turn up the vines, first on one side, then on the other side, and so all around the hill, and search out and gather every nest of eggs. The eggs are attatched to the underside of the leaves, and are about the size of a pin head, crowded together in thick clusters, and are yellow, lightish and reddish yellow. The leaves are broken off and placed in the basin with the bugs, and when picked are all burned fogether in a stove, or better by a fire made in open air on purpose, as the fumes arising from burning bugs are poisonous. They can be burnt in the stove, if the quantity is not too large, by closing the stove immediate.
