Constitutional Convention. At the coming October election the citizens of Pennsylvania will vote upon the question of calling a Convention to amend the State Constitution, under the following act passed by the last Legisla-

An act to authorize a popular vote upen the question of calling a Convention to amend the Constitution of Pennsylvania.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the question of calling a convention to amend the constitution of this commonwealth be submitted to a vote of the people at the Tuesday of October next, the said question to be voted upon in manner following to wit: In counties and cities in which slip ticket voting is authorized by law, votes for or against a convention may be expressed and given upon the ticket, headed or endorsed with the word "State," and not otherwise; and the words used shall be "Constitutional Convention," or "against'a convention," and in counties of districts in which slip ticket voting shall not be authorized by law, each elector voting upon said question shall cast a seperate ballot, endorsed on the outside Unonstitution! Convention," and containing on the inside the words "for a convention," or "against a convention;" and all votes cast as aforesaid shall be re ceived, counted and returned by the prop-er election officers and returned judges as votes for governor are received, counted

and returned under existing laws.

SEC. 2. That the election aforesaid shall be held and be subject to all the provisions of law which apply to general elections; the sheriffs of the counties shall give notice of this act in their election proclamation the present year; and the governors hall cause all the returns of the said election, as received by the secretary of the commonwealth, to Kittle. Springville—Jeremiah Stebens, George B. be laid before the legislature at its next annual election.
