#### Descriers and Bounty.

The United States Supreme Court has recent by decided an important case in reference to bounties to be paid to deserters from the army under certain circumstances. The claimant in the case under consideration had deserted; but had been restored to his position without trial and, being allowed to make up his lost time, he received an honorable discharge from the service The Paymaster General allowed the claimant the proportionate share of the bounty up to the ime of his desertion, and refused it for all the ubsequent time. The Court of Claims decided in favor of the deserter, and the Supreme Court affirmed the judgment, holding that his subse quent honorable discharge was a formal and a nal indement by the Government upon the rec ord of the soldier, and an authoritative declaration that he had left the service in a state o bonor.

Per Postmaster, to wit : They must put each deon which must be marked the number of pleces and amount. A hill is then be to made setting forth the number of each denomination, and the total amount of the whole package, which must be signed by the owner, giving Post Office ad-dress, etc. Then the bill together with the package of currency are to be made into occ package, and addressed to the Treasurer of the United States, at Washington, D. C., and marked " mutilated currency" for redemption. This having been done, the package may be taken to any Post Office, where in accordance with acction 190 of the postal code, the Postmaster is authorized to register the package without fee.
