The Eric Narrow Gauge.

The following is said to be the manner which the gauge of the Eric road will probably be changed: First construct a narrow gauge from Buffalo to Attica, thirty miles, and from Attica to Corning. There are three lines of mad operated by the Eric corporation, one via Aron and Rochester, and via Hornellsville; would probably construct a narrow gauge via Aron to Coming and Elmira. There is already a third rail from Elmira to Waverly, where con nection is made with the Lehigh Valley roadthus there would be communication by narrow gange from Buffalo to Philadelphia. The nextdep will probably be to lay a third rail from Waverly to Binghamton, where connection is made with the Albany and Susquehanna railroad to Albany. Sharp Legal Practice.
