The Reverend I. Vincient O.Reilly was born in Longford county, Ireland, October, 1797. Arriving in the northern part of Pennsylvania, he found a vast territory of about 10,000 square miles; comprising the countles of Bradord, Wyoming, Susquehanna, Wayne and part of Luzerne, in Pennsylvania, and Sullivan, Delaware, Broome, Tioga and Chemung in New York, without a Catholic clergyman to attend the followers of that denomination. At this early day the country was principally a wilderness, having no town of any importance in any part of it. About this time the Cliemung canal was in course of construction, as, also, was the North Branch canal, and the Eric railway.

These laborers employed on these works were rincipally foreigners and Catholics. And to distration of their spiritual wants, Father O'Reilly set cheerfully to work. The hardships and sufferings this good man under went in the course of his duties, cannot be fuly imagined. He was constantly on the road, day, as the occasion required, in visiting the ick, celebrating Mass, or holding a station. that let them stand up. Sometimes his journeys being long, and his engagements many, he would be compelled to ride all night in a drenching storm, and again, darkness overtaking blur in some solitude, he would be forced to dismount, and tying his horse to a sapling, he would spread his blanket on the ground and sleep till morning.

Whenever difficulties arose among his people e was always ready to make an amicable settlement. In sickness he was nurse and doctor for which reasons he was said to be priest, lawyer and doctor.
