Food for Hens.

Repeated experiments show that one bushel of corn per year is sufficient to Reep one fowl which runs at large, in ad-dition to the other things obtained by foraging. Hens that are shut up should foraging. Hens that are shut up should be allowed no more grain than those at free range, but they should be given grass in summer, mowed often so as to be kept short and tender, and in winter raw cabbage or boiled potatoes, or fresh vegetables of some kind. Also as an equivalent to the insects they are deprived of by confinement, give a small daily ration of animal food, such as sheep's lights and livers, either raw or cooked, finely minced; or, which are the cheapest and come ready cooked, chandlers' scraps crushed The value of a year's allowance of regetables and meat per head will just about equal one-fraif a bushel of corn. It wil generally be found that at times, or in parts of the country, when or where corn is remarkably cheap or dear the price of potatoes, etc., and of animal tood also, will be correspondingly high or low, so the above estimate is of wide applica

Therefore the price of one bushel of eorn represents the keeping of a fowl running at large, and fifty per cent added to this is the cast in the case of confinethis is the cost in the case of confinement. We are speaking of a breed of average size and appetite. It is not to be expected that a Cochin and a bantam will prove equal in feeding capacity. A great yield of eggs is accompanied by a great consumption of food; hence, fowls of prolific breeds may, though of small size, eat more than large hens that lay sparingly. Also a breed which like the Brahamas, tend to fatten, will, it given all they eat, consume more in preportion all they eat, consume more in proportion to their size, when not laying, than a less plump variety like the Spanish will under the same circumstances.—Prarie Far-

#### To Plow Dows Grass.

To do this offectually is one of the ap parent impossibilities of modern farming. Every farmer knows it from experience. Notwithstanding the utmost pains and care in ploughing, the grass, especially if are bound to keep everything the people want, and has long, will bristle up in beards and tuffs ment of here, there, and everywhere, injuring alike the appearance of the field and its capacity for growth; for this grass, instead of being visibly present to draw nourish-ment for itself and impede the growth of something else much more profitable, should be buried beneath the surface to manure the soil and assist in the growth of its betters. Well, do you wish to remedy this great difficulty? If so, ose the ter what kind of a plough you have, try
them. A piece of ordinary trace chain
will do very well. Fasten one end of it to your coulter, and to the other end atpounds weight—having the chain long enough to permit the ball to reach back to about the middle of your mould-board—and there let it drag along, on the off side, of course. This is not a new idea in fact it is a very old one—but, like good wine, age only improves it. Just try it once, and we have no fear of your verdict. It may not do the work to absolute perfection, but it will perform it at least fifty per cent, better than you can without it .- Canada Farmer.

#### Training a Heifer.

Cows usually become addicted to kick-ing when heifers, from being milked by abusive milkers. I have never seen an old cow become a kicker unless abused. Instead of cows being averse to being milked when giving a large quantity, I have found it the reverse. When pasturage is good and cows come home at night with udders distended with milks our "down East" cows seem grateful to have it removed. Milking a helfer for the first time requires patience, for they will almost invariably kick.
