Selecting Potatoes For Seed.

Now is the time to select seed pointoes. If left until planting time there is no selection. Those are taken that happen to be left—generally small or misshapen specimens that have proved unsaleable or have been thrown aside in selecting the best for the table. Large size is a matter of less importance in seed potatoes than smooth, well-shaped roots. The crop is grown from an eye, not a seed, and there is this important difference between the seed and the eye, that while the first almost always shows a variation from its parent by cross fertilization, the eye or cutting forms a continuous growth which must perpetuate its own characteristics.

The application of this principle in selecting seed potatoes is obvious. In the same variety there are generally some potatoes better shaped than others. Most buyers and housekeepers prefer a long po-tato. The Early Rose, when it grows of good size, takes this form, while the smallest potatoes are round. The same is true of the Peerless. By selecting the longest and smoothest specimens for planting, this habit of growth will become fixed and add largely to the value of the crop. This I know to be so by experiment. I have a theory that by cutting off the seed end a theory that by cutting off the seed end and planting only the eyes or the long, smooth part of the potato, this growth would be accelerated. It is certainly reasonable to suppose that eyes from the seed which is often nearly round, would produce more potatoes than if cut from a long, smooth surface. The seed end of potatoes is also crowded with eyes, and this also is an undesirable quality to perthis also is an undesirable quality to per-petuate. Something may also be gained by cutting out eyes that are too deeply set into the potato, or too prominent on the surface. These are objectionable features and should be guarded against. The size of seed potatoes is of minor importance except from the fact that the best shaped potatoes are of medium of large size.— Monstrosities of every shape should be avoided. With the best of care in select ing seed there will be some misshapen potatoes caused by stones or other obstacles in the soil. Manuring with coarse manure is said to make polatoes grow prong-ed or knobby; but some experiments made this year do not warrant this idea. I think ashes and gypsum on potatoes tend to make tubers large and well-shaped. If seed potatoes are kept in the celler they should be covered by a few sods to keep them from drying up, and thus injuring the eves. The sods will also retard the sprouting of large varieties until planting time, thus insuring a more vigorous growth. Almost every year some Early Rose planted about the first of June fail to grow because the eres have started oner, exhausting the starch in the potate which is dried up until it is almost worthless for seed. A little care at this time will save a great deal of vexation and loss in the Potato crop next season.

Wooden Collars,

The Maryland Farmer prints the following argument in favor of wooden col-lars. "The present huge collar chokes the horse in summer and chills him hrough the lungs in winter. A collar made of white basswood, or other light wood, would never heat, gall, or chill a horse. Experience has demonstrated thet hard wooden surface, polished and kept cican, is the safest, coolest, best, and healthiest collar over used.
