There is nothing in the Constitution that can forfeit the office of any one in office when it was adopted as all officers hold elected. The restraint upon Justices of the Peace who have not taken the oath within the required thirty days, is simply this, that they are deharred from doing any official business af-

ter that time,until they do subscribe to the oath which can be done now as well as before. There s no necessity for any one to come to the County Scat to take the oath. The Constitution says: "The oath shall be administered by some person authorized to administer oaths and shall be filed in the office of the Prothonotary. Hence any Justice who has taken the cath is now competent to administer it, and then it is simply to be filed in the Prothonotary's office.
