The "Gentleman Farmer" is one of the hap-est of English pictures, but whether it is true to nature or not is altogether another thing. The typical John Bull of the carrenturists is an English farmer, fat and jolly, with topboots and fine substantial clothes, and generally having his hands thrust deep down into his breeches pockets as if in them he guarded not only his own treasures but those of all the world. But it appears the picture is purely an imaginary one. The "gentle men" are not the solid substantial farm ers. There are a few who, like Mr. Mech the celebrated "farmer of Triptree Hall" took to farming after they became rich and had made their money first by some other business, but most of the success full farmers there as well as here are those who were brought up to farming from their beylood and who are familiar with all the details of farm-work and farm-markets.

It is a pity perhaps to take down all these levely pictures of the gentleman farmer and in their places substitute mere charcoal sketches of what things really are; but poetry is all well enough n its place.
