The Pittsburgh American manufacturer announces what may be considered the commencement of a new industry in his city. Messrs. Rogers & Burdell of that of that city have succeeded in the manufacture of tin plates at a cost which enables them to compete with the imported article. Up to this time the cost of making iron sheets suitable for timbering has been so great as to place it entirely out of the power of our American manufacturers to compete in price with the foreign. As a result we imported during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1874, 1,211,776 cwt. of iron plates, valued at \$12,992,923. Messrs. Rogers & Burdell, however, by taking advantage of the facilities for producing an extra quantity of iron in the puddling furnace by the use of natural gas and blast, are enabled to make out of our ordinary pig iron sheets suitable for timbering without the use of an ounce of charcoal. They are making at present 30 to 35 boxes per day and are meeting the prices of English iron, and it furnishes a better article.

TREASURY IMPLICATED IN TREASURY ROBING.

By the State Treasurer's report for 1867 it is shown that Wm. B. Mann received \$12,144.44 "for examining books of foreign insurance companies" and in 1868 he received \$16,022.74 for the same service—making in the two years over \$30,000 for services of little account and little value! It was privately explained however, that this money was not given to Mr. Mann for his personal use but to aid in carrying the elections for the Republicans.
