

U. S. 7-30 LOAN.

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coupon Treasury Notes, payable three years from Aug. 15th, 1864, with semi-annual interest at the rate of seven and three-tenths per cent. per annum—principal and interest both to be paid in lawful money.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, in and by the act of the General Assembly, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to direct the manner, time and place of holding Elections for President and Vice President of the United States," enacted the 23rd day of February, 1820, it is required of the Sheriff to give due notice of such Elections: therefore

I, JAMES W. HAMILTON, High Sheriff of the county of Juniata, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the citizens of the said county, who are qualified to vote for members of general assembly, that on the **SECOND TUESDAY OF NOVEMBER** next, being the 8th day of said month, an election will be held at the same place at which the said member shall have been voted for by a ballot, preceding election for the purpose of electing twenty-seven persons of this Commonwealth as electors for the election of President and Vice President of the United States and the several Judges, Inspectors and Clerks, who attended the general election on the Second Tuesday of October last, are hereby enjoined to attend and perform at the said election of Electors to be held as aforesaid the like duties, subject to the like penalties for neglect or misconduct, as they are liable to at the election of members of Assembly, &c.

ALSO HEREBY MAKE KNOWN and give notice, that the places of holding the aforesaid General Election in the several districts and townships in the county of Juniata are as follows, to wit:

At the Court House in the borough of Millintown, for the borough of Millintown.

At the Court House in the borough of Millintown, for Fermanagh township.

At the School House in Mexico, for Walker township.

At the Academy in Thompsonstown, for Delaware township.

At the Public House of Thomas Cox, for Greenwood township.

At the School House in Richfield, for Monroe township.

At Knouse's School House, for Susquehanna township.

At the School House in McAllisterville, for Fayette township.

At the School House in Patterson, for the borough of Patterson.

At the School House in Perryville, for the borough of Perryville.

At the Locust Grove School House, near the residence of John T. Mettlen, for Milford township.

At the School House near the residence of Samuel Allen, for Beale township.

At the School House near Metuloh MIF for Tuscarora township, except that portion of it lying north-westward of the summit of Slide Mountain.

At the Lick School House near the residence of Benjamin Walls, for Lack township, except that portion of it lying north-westward of the summit of the Slide Mountain.

At the Centre School House in the townships of Lack and Tuscarora lying north-westward of the summit of the Slide Mountain.

At the Church School House, in Turbett township, for Turbett township.

I ALSO MAKE KNOWN and give notice in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid Act I am directed, that every person, except Justice of the Peace, who shall hold an office of appointment, of profit or trust, under the Government of the United States, or of this State, or of any City or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judiciary or executive department of this State or of the United States, or of any City or incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress, and of the State Legislature and of the Select and Common Council of any City, or Commissioner of any incorporated district, by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of a Judge, Inspector, or other officer of any such election in this Commonwealth, and that no Judge, Inspector, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office.

Also that in the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to Executive and for other purposes," approved August 13th, 1845, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section "shall not be construed so as to prevent any military officer or borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any General or Special Election of this Commonwealth."

Also that in the 10th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to the 10th section of the Act, first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate of return of the election of their respective districts and produce them at a meeting of the Judges from each district, at the Court House in the Borough of Millintown on the third day after the day of election, being for the present year on Friday, the 11th day of November, A. D. 1864, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said Judges.

Also, by the 19th section of "an Act to regulate elections by soldiers in actual military service," approved the 25th of August, A. D. 1864, "the return Judges of the several counties, shall enjoy to meet at the places, now directed by law, on the third Friday after general or Presidential election, for the purpose of counting the soldiers' vote."

The return Judges will re-assemble at the Court House, in the Borough of Millintown, on **FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 25th, 1864**, who shall receive from the principal voters of the county and shall include in their connection, the votes so returned, by the soldiers in actual military service.

Also that where a Judge by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate of return aforesaid, shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or Clerks of the election of said district, who shall do and perform the duties required of said Judge unable to attend.

Agreeably to the provisions of the 5th section of said act, every General and Special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening when the polls shall be closed.
