MIFFLINTOWN AND PATTERSON MARKETS.

Table listing market prices for various commodities like Flour, Butter, Eggs, etc. in Mifflintown and Patterson.

PHILADELPHIA MARKETS.—There was no shipping demand for Flour, and the transactions were confined to a few hundred bbls for home consumption, at 88¢/95¢. 50¢/bbl for superfine; 82¢/95¢ for extra; 89¢/102¢ for Northwestern extra family; 81¢/95¢ for Pennsylvania and Ohio do, and at higher figures for fancy lots, according to quality. There is but little Rye Flour here and it commands 86¢/90¢. For Corn Meal prices are nominal.

GRAIN.—The wheat market is dropping, and there is very little demand; 400 bush, good new red sold at \$2 20, and a small lot of white at \$2 60. Rye is scarce; 700 bush, Delaware sold at \$1 65. Corn is more required after and has advanced; 100 bush, heavily sold at 80¢; 5000 bush, of good quality at 82¢/84¢, chiefly at 84¢, about, and 700 bush, at 80¢; a car load of yellow sold at 85¢.—Oats are firmer and held at 51¢/52 cents. In Barley no sales have come under our notice.
