REDUCTION IN PRICES.—We have the pleasure of informing our readers that domestic goods in Philadelphia are tending downward, and qualities which a short time ago were held firm at fifty cents, wholesale, are now retailing at thirty-five cents per yard. This is, indeed, cheering news for the poor.

Mr. Blackford, of Patterson, has purchased the interest of Mr. Kaufman in the butchering business, and hereafter proposes to carry on the business on his own account. Blackford is a good, clever, honest fellow, kills none but good cattle, and sells his beef a little cheaper than any other person in the county. Try Blackford and be convinced.

CAN'T BE BEAT.—We have received of Mr. William Whitson, of Pottsville township, an ear of corn containing 1272 grains. The grains on this ear will weigh if shelled, about 11 ounces, and 814 ears will make 56 pounds, or one bushel of shelled corn. Three stalks to each hill, four feet each way, will allow 8205 stalks, or 2735 hills to one acre, producing one hundred bushels of shelled corn. Who can beat it?

A meeting of the Soldiers' of 61 and 62, will be held in the Court House, Mifflintown, on Friday evening December 15th for the purpose of selecting delegates to represent them in the National Convention to be held in Philadelphia on the 1st day of January, 1866. The object of the Convention is to memorialize Congress to equalize the bounty. Full attendance is expected.

MANY SOLDIERS.

LARGE HOG.—Mr. Amos Snyder, of this borough, killed a hog on last Wednesday, which, when cleaned weighed 508 pounds.

Mr. S. had in his bar-room, a box wherein each individual desiring to guess at the weight of the hog deposited twenty-five cents. The contents of the box, amounting to about twenty dollars, was divided between Messrs. Hamilton and Rhiner, they having guessed the weight exactly.

FIRE.—On Tuesday morning November 28th a dwelling house owned and occupied by a Mr. Searer, near Thompston, caught fire and was burned to the ground. A considerable portion of the furniture, bedding &c., was destroyed. Mr. Searer's loss is estimated at about sixteen hundred dollars. The fire originated from a stove pipe passing through the roof of a back building—At this season of the year, persons can not be too careful with their stove pipes. A little expense in procuring guards or collars for the pipes and a little extra watchfulness may save hundreds of dollars.

PHILADELPHIA MARKETS.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 5, 1865. Trade is exceedingly quiet in all de-partments, but a more animated state of affairs is anticipated after the meeting of Congress, and the publication of the re-ports of the Departments.

FLOUR AND MEAL.—The flour market is extremely dull, there being a total absence of any shipping and no dis-position on the part of the home consum-ers to purchase beyond their immediate necessities. Sales of 600 bbls. Northwest-ern extra family, to go out of the market on private terms; 400 bbls. do at \$9@9.50; 200 bbls. fancy Indiana at 12, and 100 bbls. Lancaster county at a price kept secret. Rye Flour is dull. In Corn Meal nothing doing to fix prices.

GRAIN.—The Wheat market is very heavy, and prices have declined 4@5¢ per bush. Sales of 4000 bush. fair and strictly prime new red at \$2 15@2 25, and 500 bush. old do. at \$2 30. We quote white at \$2 45@2 75. Rye comes in slowly, and may be quoted at \$1 10 for Pennsylvania, and \$1 05 for Southern. Corn has again declined, which has caused more activity. Sales of 14,000 bush yellow at 85¢ for old, and \$1¢ for prime dry raw, including some damp New Jersey at 68¢. Oats are 2¢ lower. 8000 bush. sold at 48¢ for Delaware, and 50¢ for Pa.

SEEDS.—There is very little good Cloverseed coming forward, and it is want-ed at \$8@8 25, and poor quality at \$7@7 50. Nothing doing in Timothy. The receipts of Flaxseed are small, and it commands \$3 15@3 20. GOLD.—The Gold market closed at \$1 47 1/2.
