HOW TO DETECT THE NEW COUNTERFEIT FIFTY CENT CURRENCY.—The most recent of the counterfeit fifty cent notes are so well executed that they are likely to deceive even the best "experts." The following information will be found useful in aiding our readers to detect them: The counterfeit is about an eighth of an inch shorter than the genuine. The words "United States" in the counterfeit are not so clearly defined as in the genuine. The sword held by the female in the vignette appears as a white streak in the genuine. In the counterfeit it is more heavily engraved. Under the word "and" in the right upper corner there is a flourish in the counterfeit. The last defect is one of the simplest means of detecting the bogus notes.
