TOWN AND COUNTRY.

The rain which fell during Sunday night last froze as fast as it fell, and on Monday the streets and side walks were covered with a sheet of ice, and quite a number of accidents resulted from it.

The ice which has bridged the Juniata river for some time took its departure one evening last week with "a great noise and the rushing of many waters." It went away without doing any damage.

RUN OFF.—A horse belonging to Mr. William Whitson, while in Patterson, run off, and going to the river, traveled on the ice along the shore, which gave way, and had not assistance been rendered the horse would have drowned.

RAIL ROAD ACCIDENT.—An accident occurred at Wolfkill's Sliding, Pa. Rail Road, on Friday morning last, about 10 o'clock. The truck wheels under engine, No. 138 broke, throwing a portion of a freight train off the track. No damage was sustained further than the breaking of a truck and stopping the trains for a few hours.

It contained hay, shavings, tags—and we know the young lady never used a fine toothed comb—so that we think the statement is not true.

The neglect to stamp receipts given for money or goods has become so common that the Revenue Department has sent out orders to have the law enforced against delinquents. The fine is fifty dollars for neglecting to apply the stamp by the party giving the receipt. Prosecutions are to be commenced, we understand, against all who are detected in violating the regulations. A receipt for any amount less than twenty dollars requires no stamp.

BUILDING ASSOCIATION.—The citizens of Millifort and vicinity assembled in the Court House on Saturday evening last and perfected an organization of the Millifort Building Association. Books have been opened, and stock can be had by calling at Mr. Weidman's Book Store. This is a move in the right direction, and our citizens should encourage it, as it will enhance the value of property, and at the same time enable poor men to purchase houses.

JUDGE LEWIS has decided that no person is bound to give a receipt for funds paid, a receipt being an instrument of evidence useful only to the person to whom it is given, therefore, if a man needs a receipt it is his place to furnish the stamp for it, if one is required. But if a person gives a receipt without requiring that the party to whom it is given shall furnish the stamp, the maker of the receipt must himself stamp the paper before he delivers it. If he fails to stamp it before he delivers it he is liable to the penalty provided by law for the omission, but the other party may stamp it immediately upon its being received.

ANOTHER R. R. ACCIDENT.—On Saturday morning last the First Stock Train east, drawn by engine No. 284, broke its coupling, leaving the cabin and ten coal cars standing on the track near Black Log Station. As soon as the loss was discovered, the engineer backed his train to secure the cars, and while winding Lauer's curve, he came in collision with the missing cars which were being pushed by the second train engine, No. 105. Both trains were moving at a moderate speed, but the collision was terrific, completely demolishing the cabin car and eight or ten coal cars, and breaking in the front end of engine No. 105. A brakeman had his leg broken, and two boys who had got on the train at Black Log, were severely injured. The injured persons were brought to Patterson. Drs. Leigh and Crawford dressed their wounds.
