MASS MEETING.

In pursuance of a previous call, a large and enthusiastic meeting composed of ladies and gentlemen, was held in the Court House on Monday evening February 26th, to hear the Veto Message of President Johnson on the Freedman's Bureau Bill...

President—Capt. F. M. MICKEY. Vice Presidents—Col. William Bell, Hon. John Beale, Col. J. K. Robison, William Given, Esq., Daniel Sieber, Jacob Thomas, D. H. Weller, Nathan Keely, Jacob Bergy, Michael Hoffman, John McKinley, J. A. Gallager, David Wilson, T. B. Hildebrand.

Secretaries—B. S. Cook, B. C. Stewart, J. H. Hollman, J. G. Funk, E. W. H. Kreider, Frederick Espenshade. On motion of Col. William Bell, E. C. Stewart, Esq., was called on to read the President's Veto Message, which he did in his usual eloquent style.

A motion was then made authorizing the President to appoint a Committee to draft resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting, when the following gentlemen were appointed: E. W. H. Kreider, Capt. A. H. Martin, Jacob Bergy, R. Doyle, Esq., and H. H. Willag. A unanimous call was made for Col. John T. Patterson to address the meeting, when he appeared amid rounds of applause, and in a speech of an hour and ten minutes length reviewed the Freedman's Bureau Bill as passed by Congress, taking substantially the same view as those endorsed by the Hon. Wm. H. Seward. It was one of the Colonel's best efforts, his scathing denunciation of treason and traitors elicited loud applause. He showed conclusively that the present bureau law is adequately sufficient for the protection of the Freedman and with a strong appeal to all parties irrespective of political predilection to stand by the Union and the Government and the honest Union majority in Congress the Colonel retired. Dr. S. O. Kempfer was then loudly called for. The Dr. came forward and after the enthusiasm had subsided proceeded in a brief but eloquent speech to show that the public mind was not yet fully prepared to pass upon the great issues of the day, urging that these matters should be weighed wisely and with care. The Dr. was frequently interrupted by the appreciation of his audience. The resolutions were then called for and read by E. W. H. Kreider, and are as follows:

Resolved, That we have full faith in President Johnson and his Cabinet, and the Union members of both Houses of Congress, in the sincere desire and determination of all of them to conduct the affairs of the Government in such a manner as to secure the best interests of the whole people. And we hereby declare that we will sustain them in all constitutional efforts to preserve peace and order, and a permanent Union.

Resolved, That in Andrew Johnson we recognize the patriot, true and tried, and will support him, in all constitutional efforts to restore authority, law and order among the people of the States lately in Rebellion, on the basis of equal justice to all men; and that we pledge to the Administration, Executive and Legislative, our united and hearty co-operation in all wise and prudent measures devised for the security of the Government against rebellion and insurrection in time to come; and while indorsing the President we express entire confidence in the Union majority of Congress.

Resolved, That it is the province of the legislative branch of the Government to determine the question of reconstruction, and in the exercise of that power Congress should have in view the loyalty of the people of those States and their devotion to the Constitution and obedience to the laws. Until the people of those States prove themselves loyal to the Government they should not be restored to the rights enjoyed before the Rebellion.

Resolved, That no man who voluntarily participated in the Rebellion ought to be admitted to a seat in Congress, and, under the Constitution of the United States, the power to determine the qualifications requisite of electors rests with the States respectively.

Resolved, That the union of these States has not and cannot be dissolved except by successful revolution.

Resolved, That justice and duty demands and equalization of the benefits to our national defenders.

Resolved, That we approve of the course of Hon. Geo. F. Miller our Representative in Congress and his faithful discharge of his public duties entitles him to our approbation.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

IMPORTANT TO TAX PAYERS.—It has been decided by the Commissioners of Internal Revenue, "That, by the term of the 33rd Section of the Revenue Law, the taxes on manufacturers and producers are to be paid within ten days from the 20th day of each month, or on and before a day to be prescribed by the Commissioner, and for failure to pay within the prescribed time the tax payer is liable to a penalty of ten percentum on the amount of the tax. This penalty must be collected in all cases when a tax payer has become liable thereto, as the collector has no discretion in the matter, but, in order to avoid all occasions for dissatisfaction, Collectors are advised to issue notices to all persons assessed immediately upon the receipt of the list informing them of their liability under the law. It must be distinctly understood, however, that this notice is not required by the terms of the law, but is entirely gratuitous on the part of Revenue Officers. No person can claim an exemption from the penalty by virtue of the non-receipt of the notice."
