THE INCOME TAX.—It is now so certain that no action will be taken by Congress amending the income tax in season to affect the next assessment, that the Commissioner of Internal Revenue has commenced the preparation of blanks and instructions under the existing law. Assessors and Assistant Assessors will be instructed to prepare immediately for the assessment.

EQUALIZING BOUNTIES.—The bill to equalize bounties, introduced by Mr. Julian, and referred to the Committee on Military Affairs, provides for the payment to every soldier and sailor who served during the late war, and who has been or may be honorably discharged, a bounty of eight and one-third dollars for every month of service rendered, provided that in case of discharge on account of wounds received in action, the full bounty shall be paid for the term of service for which the enlistment was made. No bounty is to be paid to any soldier or sailor who was a prisoner of war at the time of enlistment, or who had been discharged at his own request, or to accept promotion, nor to any sailor whose prize money shall exceed the amount of bounty he would be entitled to.

OF ALL DAYS in the year, what Emerson calls "the joy of eventful living," is the first of April. This year it had a doubly significance, as it happened on Easter, the festival of hope, and in it the Resurrection is explained in the lively procession of the seasons. The first of April is generally called "all fools day," and many are the individuals that are sent hither and yon on fool's errands, and are laughed at for their pains. Oriental scholars declare that the custom is derived from the bull feast of the Hindus which has a similar usage.
