TO SPORTSMEN.—For the information of those who are unacquainted with the game law of this State, and who sometimes unknowingly violate said law, we publish the following extract passed by the Legislature:

SECTION 2. That from and after the passage of this act, no person shall shoot, kill or otherwise destroy pheasant between the first day of January and the first day of September, or a squirrel between the first day of January and the first day of August, or any woodcock between the first day of January and the fourth day of July, or any partridge or rabbit between the first day of January and the first day of November in the present year, and in each and every year thereafter, under the penalty of five dollars for each and every offense.

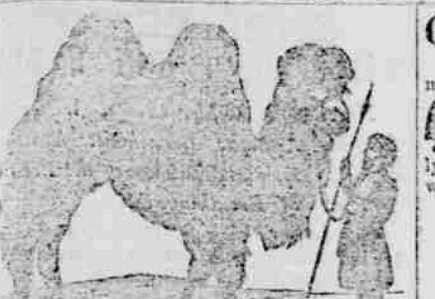
