M.L.S. THE ALTERATION IN THE COLUMBIA DAM.—We have before noticed the fact that workmen were then employed in forming a coffer dam at Columbia to facilitate the passage of fish up the Susquehanna. We have since learned that the dimensions of the coffer will be 50 by 78 feet, and that it is being sunk in the river immediately above the site selected for the erection by the Susquehanna canal company of a sluice dam.—The sluice will be made in the dam about one-third the distance over from the York county shore. It is to be 40 feet in width at the lower edge of the dam, and will extend up the river a distance of sixty feet, narrowing to twenty feet width at the upper end, and will extend thirty feet up stream from the upper edge of the dam. The sides will be formed of framed timber, twelve feet wide each, and filled in with stone. The bottom of the sluice will have an inclination of five feet in the whole distance of sixty feet. The upper end will be twelve inches lower than the embankment of the dam. It is intended to put in at the head of the sluice a breaker-crib, in the form of the letter V. The sluice will be completed by the 1st of November.—Telegraph.
