THE APPLE ROT.—The tendency of our fine crop of apples to rot this season, is the subject of universal complaint.—It is so we believe in all parts of the country. This is much to be regretted as it seems to be very evident from the testimony before us, that this excellent fruit must be subjected to immediate use, and cannot be successfully preserved for winter's use. Will some of our experienced horticulturists please inform us if they can, of the cause of this speedy decay of our apple crop this season?

BURNED TO DEATH.—On Saturday night last Mr. Nathan Thomas, residing in Perryville, this county, was burned to death. The particulars of the accident as near as we can gather them, are as follows: Mr. Thomas had been living by himself for a number of years, keeping "bachelor's hall," and on the evening of the accident had retired at about half past nine, by closing the under-ground door leading to the kitchen. The door was fastened with a bar, and about twelve o'clock the fire was discovered, when a number of citizens rushed to the scene. When he was taken from the burning, he was a corpse. It is said he lived rather an intemperate life, and it is supposed he was under the influence of liquor at the time of the accident.

A FAST COMPOSITOR.—In the office of a Wisconsin journal there is a compositor who sets type so rapidly that the friction of his movements fuses the leaded emblems in his stick, making them solid, like a stereotyped plate. The only way to prevent this is to have his case submerged in water, and the rapidity of his motions keeps the water boiling and bubbling, so that eggs have frequently boiled in the space-box. Pipes lead from the bottom of his case to a boiler in the press-room, and the steam generated by the fast compositor's motions runs the power press. In one day he sets so much type that it took all hands, from editor to devil, two weeks to read the proof, and it wasn't his good day for setting type either! We will not vouch for the above.

DANGEROUS PRACTICE.—Many persons who use kerosene or coal oil lamps are in the habit, when going to bed or leaving a room for a short time, of turning the wick down, in order to save a gulf of the consumption of oil. The consequence is that the air of the room soon becomes vitiated by the unconsumed oil vapors, by the gas produced by combustion, and also by the minute particles of smoke and soot which are thrown off. Air thus poisoned is deadly in its effects, and the wonder is that more persons are not immediately and fatally injured by breathing it. Irritation and inflammation of the throat and lungs, headache, dizziness and nausea are among its effects.
