BOUNTY ACCOUNTS—In last week's issue we referred to the provisions of the general law requiring the township Auditors to settle all Bounty accounts. Since then we learn that a special law has been passed restoring the old law authorizing the court to appoint special Auditors to settle such accounts and has been signed by the Governor. Under this act, ten or more tax payers can apply to the court by petition for an Auditor, and the Auditor's report, as amended or approved by the court is final.

A GENERAL CALL—An appeal has been made for a convention to be held at Harrisburg, on Tuesday, February 26th, at two o'clock P. M. The call is signed by Governor Geary and the members of the Legislature. It begins by representing that 60,000 die annually, 100,000 go to prison, 100,000 to the almshouse, and that 500 murders and 400 suicides are committed every year, through the appetite for strong drink. It is to devise measures to do away with the evil. Very eminent speakers are announced to be present on the occasion.

BENEFIT OF THE JUNIATA CORNET BAND—The address delivered in the Court House, in this place, on Last Saturday Evening by Captain S. Adams Lee, was a decided success. Business prevented us from hearing all of the address, but what we did hear and the commendations of his audience convinced us that Capt. Lee understood his subject and had discharged the duty he had so kindly taken upon himself in behalf of the band. The Band was out in full force and discoursed excellent music for the occasion, the receipts were \$39.70

A NEW COUNTERFEIT QUARTER—A new and dangerous counterfeit of the twenty-five cent issue has recently appeared. It is almost perfectly engraved and well calculated to deceive the most practical eye. Upon close examination it may be detected by noticing that the scroll work around the figures "25," on the upper left hand corner, touches the fine lines around the edges of the note which form the bordering, while on the genuine no part of the scroll work touches the line. When these notes become worn and dirty they will duly detection.
