PRUNE YOUR GRAPE VINES.—A gentleman who pays considerable attention to the culture of grapes says that grape vines should be pruned during the month of February. In trimming, cut away two thirds of the length of last year's growth, and all straggling spindling vines. Don't be afraid of cutting too closely.—Don't let the month pass without attending to this matter if you desire a good crop of this luscious fruit.

FACTS CONCERNING HUMAN LIFE.—The total number of human beings on the earth is computed at 2,000,000,000, and they speak 2000 known tongues. The average duration of life is 32 1/2 years.

Our fourth of those born, die before they are seven years old, and one half before they are the age of seventeen. Our of one hundred persons, only six reach the age of sixty. Out of five hundred persons, only one attains the age of eighty. Sixty persons die every minute. Tall men live longer than short ones. Married men are longer lived than the single. Rich men live, on the average 42 years but the poor only thirty. There is a drunkard to every 74.

EARLY POTATOES.—A writer in the "Farmer's Club," reported in the New York Weekly Tribune, gives the following directions for getting early potatoes a fortnight in advance of those planted in the open ground, however carefully: Take shallow boxes of any convenient size—starch or soap boxes may be sawed so as to make two, four to six inches.—Spread an inch of fine manure on the bottom, then an inch of dirt, on which the single eyes or small pieces of potatoes are laid, eyes upward, about two inches apart over the surface, and cover with two inches of soil. Prepare these boxes from the first to the middle of March, keep them in a moderately cool place for a week, then place in a warm room, watering as needed, and giving as much sun shine and air as possible, avoiding frosts. They may be set out of doors every pleasant day, and by the time weather is suitable for planting they will have strong stalk several inches high. To transplant, remove the bottom, raise the sides, and cut through the mass, taking out two inch squares with the potato and principal roots, and when set out there is scarcely a check to their growth.

BURIED ALIVE.—A painful and heart-rending occurrence took place at Dallas town, York County, on Monday the 12th inst., by which a young man by the name of R. S. Ayers lost his life and was literally buried alive. It seems that the buck of the well had dropped off its fastenings, and the young man went down to recover it, but scarcely had he got to the bottom when the wall and earth caved in upon him, burying him under its pressure to the depth of about fifty feet. Operations were at once commenced to rescue him if possible from his fearful position, and stout workmen kept digging during the balance of the day and the whole of Monday night, but up until 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning, they were still fifteen feet from the bottom of the well. At a latter hour on Tuesday the body of the young man was recovered dead, and partly submerged in the water. There were several feet of water in the well at the time of the occurrence.
