COOK BAKED—Put three pints of water in a kettle and let it boil; stir to cream and enough to make a thin mush; add it with water until about lukewarm; add in one teaspoonful of yeast, and corn meal enough to make a thick mush. Season with salt and set in a warm place to rise. As soon as it rises, put in a hot oven in pans well greased (the old-fashioned Dutch oven preferable) bake slow, but not too hard on top.

DESTINY CATERPILLAR EGGS NOW—The *Meloe fasciata* eggs, during this month the eggs of the apple-tree caterpillar—which may be found encircling the ends of the small twigs of the tree—can be much more easily and completely destroyed than they can at any other time of the year. They can be readily seen, and by choosing a warm day for the operation, with a light halter upon which to ascend the tree, and a small basket in which to put the twigs containing the nests, the work can be performed most satisfactorily.

The following are some of the changes made in the Internal Revenue laws by the act approved March 2, 1867: The amount of income exempt from tax has been increased from \$500 to \$1000, and the tax of 10 per cent. on sums above \$5000 has been repealed; so that the law now imposes a uniform tax of 5 per cent. on incomes in excess of \$1000. Profits on sales of real estate purchased since Dec. 1, 1863, are made taxable as income.

The tax on musical instruments, and on carriages worth less than \$300, has been repealed.

The time for commencing the annual assessments has been changed from May to March. The office of Distillery Inspector has been abolished.
