DESERIERS OF FAMILIES.—Heretofore wives and children had but little remedy against husbands and fathers deserting them, but by an act passed by the last winter's Legislature ample provision has been made for such. The new law provides that if any husband or father separates himself from his wife and children, or either, without reasonable cause, or shall neglect to maintain his family or any portion of it, upon information made by his wife or children, or either of them or by any other person, said deserter, shall be held to answer at court. When tried and found guilty, he shall be ordered by the court to pay such sum as the court may think proper (not exceeding \$100 per month) for the maintenance of his family, and until the order is complied with, or bail given, he shall be kept in prison.
