Measure your berries and braise them; to every gallon adding one quart of boiling water. Let the mixture stand twenty-four hours, stirring occasionally; then strain off the liquor into a cask; to every gallon adding two pounds of sugar; cork tight, and let it stand till the following October, and you will have wine ready for use, without further straining or boiling.

The son of a brave Revolutionary soldier, Sergeant Walls was "very much a soldier." In the battle of Pleasant Hill, April, 1861, he was wounded in the left shoulder, but, against all entreaties to retire, he still held high in the air the flag he loved—held it in his right hand and teeth.

In the language of his Colonel, "There was no finer man in the 47th Regiment." After the conclusion of the religious services on the occasion of his funeral, the mortal remains of Mr. Walls were deposited in the Waterford graveyard—Captain Jas. J. Patterson late of the 148th P. V., Niblock Smith of the 49th, Matthias Stump of the 120th, and Robert Hurrell of the 47th acting as pall-bearers—a large number of his relatives, neighbors and fellow-soldiers falling in solemn procession.
