PROCEEDINGS OF THE JUNIATA COUNTY TEMPERANCE CONVENTION. AFTERNOON SESSION. Agreeably to a call, issued through the public prints, Delegates from the various Churches, Temperance organizations, and friends of Temperance generally in Juniata county, assembled in the Court House, in Mifflintown, at 2 o'clock P. M., on Monday, July 22nd.

The meeting was called to order by Rev. G. D. Chenoweth, Corresponding Secretary of the Pennsylvania State Temperance Union, who nominated Rev. E. W. Kirby for temporary President. On motion, J. T. L. Salm was elected Recording Secretary. Rev. E. W. Kirby, upon taking the chair, in a brief and eloquent address returned thanks for the honor conferred upon him, &c., and called upon Rev. W. Y. Brown, of Perryville, to open with prayer.

Chenoweth addressed the Convention concerning the rise and progress of the State Temperance Union, and briefly reviewed the object and purpose of the present Convention.

CONSTITUTION FOR A COUNTY TEMPERANCE UNION.—We believe the time has fully come, when all Christian Ministers, Churches, Temperance Organizations and the friends of Temperance generally, to form a "Union Association" in the County for the more effectual accomplishment of the good results at which we aim.

ARTICLE 1.—NAME.—This society shall be called the Juniata County Temperance Union, auxiliary to the Pennsylvania State Temperance Union. ARTICLE 2.—OBJECT.—The object shall be to promote the cause of total abstinence from the use, manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks as a beverage.

ARTICLE 3.—MEMBERS.—The society shall be composed of delegates not exceeding ten in number, from any Church, Temperance Society, College, Academy or organization within the county, who after signing the pledge and the roll book of the society, and paying to the Treasurer one dollar annually, shall be entitled to all the privileges of members.

ARTICLE 4.—PLEDGE.—No person shall be a member of this society who does not subscribe to the following pledge: We the undersigned, do agree that we will not use intoxicating liquors as a beverage, nor traffic in them; that we will not provide them as an article of entertainment, or for persons in our employment; and that in all suitable ways we will discountenance their use throughout the community.

ARTICLE 5.—OFFICERS.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer with an Executive Committee of one or more from each township and hold office until their successors are elected, and shall constitute a Board of Managers, three of whom shall be a quorum, and shall have power to fill all vacancies and conduct the meetings and interests of the society, and report quarterly to the President the number of meetings held, and the names enrolled on the pledge from the respective townships.

ARTICLE 6.—MEETINGS.—The society shall hold annual, and quarterly, and such other meetings as the Board shall judge best, or the society may direct. ARTICLE 7.—AMENDMENTS.—This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of the society, by the vote of two-thirds of the members present, the amendment having been proposed at the previous meeting.

The Constitution was then signed by a number of the Delegates and on motion, R. P. McWilliams, was elected Treasurer pro tem to take charge of the funds paid into the Treasury.

requested, and it is their duty, to encourage and provide for the holding of public meetings in their respective townships, through their Pastors, Churches, Sabbath Schools, &c., and to call out speakers for such occasions and to recommend the total abstinence pledge for signers, and that each township report quarterly to the President of the County Union the number of meetings held and the names enrolled.

Resolved, That we deem it of the first importance, that the rising generation be carefully instructed and guarded against the evils of intemperance, and we earnestly recommend that the subject should be brought to the attention of the Sabbath School Superintendents and Teachers, with the request that they co-operate with us in securing the pledges of the children under their charge to total abstinence.

Resolved, That as the diffusion of sound intelligence is essentially necessary in every moral reform, we recommend to all the friends of Temperance the Leader, published by J. H. Keatly, Hollidaysburg, Pa., the American Guardian, published in Philadelphia, and also the National Temperance Advocate, and Youth's Temperance Banner, published at No. 173, William street, N. Y., as an efficient means of prosecuting the work.

Resolved, That the licensing of saloons, and the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, is a civil right, the people should be protected by wholesome legislation, and that as a license gives freedom and approves respectability to the traffic, and denies the proper protection to the people, therefore it is the right and duty of the citizens of this Commonwealth in self-defence, by legislation and all suitable means to bring such traffic to an end.

Resolved, That it is inconsistent with the obligations of persons professing christianity, or as members of any Temperance organization to manufacture, sell, or use ardent spirits as a beverage, to sign petitions for a license, or to rent their property to retail ardent spirits, or in any way to give countenance to the traffic.

Resolved, That the licensing of acknowledged evils is wrong in morals and ruinous in legislation, that a righteous law is a potent instrument to create a right public sentiment, and that a bad law depraves and corrupts public sentiment, consequently we can never give our sanction to a law that licenses the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

On motion, the Convention adjourned to meet in the same place at 7 o'clock in the evening. EVENING SESSION. Session opened with prayer by Rev. J. H. Kennedy. The minutes of the afternoon session were then read, and there being no objection, were approved.

The report of the Committee on Permanent Organization was read, and on motion, received and adopted.
